I also recognise those whose ongoing effort to protect and promote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures will leave a lasting legacy for future Elders and leaders."

Circle Activity:

- Echo singing, pitch matching
- Movement, body warm up
- Rhythm sticks: ta, ti-ti
- Listen and identify "rest" in the instrumental ta, ti-ti section of the music
- Vary body percussion for ta and ti-ti, call for ideas from the class




Activities:

- Call and response
- Partner students for echo and pitch matching
- Ostinato with multiple melodies and harmonies layering effect
- Movement with beat, off beat and rhythm (including body percussion)
- Include tonic and dominant tuned percussion
- Untuned percussion may also be added for performance and in class preparation

- Student acting as "kangaroo" faces the board holding kangaroo while the other students sit behind student and sing the song. Circle activity applicable to students who are very familiar with each other (due to confrontational nature of the shape which in my experience creates inhibition).
- Pitch placement on body demonstrating high and low (and/or Curwen hand signs).
- Opportunity for solo singing: hunter, question and answer, head voice development.
- Puppets for children to hold when acting as the kangaroo and/or hunter.
- Hunter may be substituted with "someone" as stated in "Catch A Song."
- Children learn to applaud classmates when the singing voice is demonstrated.
- Starting pitch C as sol and F as do to develop the head voice.
