## Kokoliko (clucking of chickens)

Traditinal Song from the Luhya People of Kenya

## Synopsis:

There are certain aspects of African traditions, social norms, religion and collective rituals that impact the staple foods and gender roles. For example, among the Luhya people of Kenya, the chickens are raised by the fathers, and when they are mature and ready, they are sought and caught by the children, after which the chickens are slaughtered by the father, and finally fried or barbecued by the mother. In this song, the family is getting ready to prepare chicken for dinner, a ritualistic preparation usually accompanied with song and movement. So sit back and enjoy *Kokoliko* from Kenya.
